It has reached over 100 people from church and community: enabling those with a disability or dementia to join in and run their own activities. Carers and helpers have very much supported the growth of all our new initiatives in Skipton, Silsden and Keighley. So a very big thank you goes out to them. It has been a great pleasure to have been Coordinator of this

very special project as there are plenty of successes to list: from our support of the dementia friendly Inter-schools football tournament in Skipton to our involvement in Sporting Memories. Then of course there is the dementia awareness raising for St Joseph's, Our Lady of Lourdes and Holy Family Schools that we achieved: not forgetting the inter-generational project that culminated in the Making Memories film documentary that was shown at Keighley

Picture House before Christmas. Silsden also produced a very successful Friendship Club which will continue throughout 2019 and beyond. The Lunch at The Lion will also continue on a monthly basis at the Springbank Care Home in Silsden where locals have been having lunch and chatting with residents over the past 9 months, to create a sense of community for them. Our Lady of Mount Carmel has run its own monthly club which has been nothing but creative, with Father Christmas popping by in December! It is a very inclusive group with regular visits from several residents at The Raikes Care Home.

Our Churches Together initiative The Lunch at The Lion Club has enabled those with disabilities and their carers to get out into the community thanks to the great support of Megan and Luke at the pub. The Rev David from St James also kindly helped with

co-hosting this activity.

Jane, The Activities Coordinator at Springbank Care Home will now continue to facilitate this group on a monthly basis as it's a worthwhile and valued time of food and fellowship for people.

And The Later Life Cobbydale group which is a local wellbeing networking group for over 50s in Silsden produced a leaflet of the towns activities and groups to encourage older people to be part of a healthy community. Embrace was pro-active in supporting the creation of this resource and joined in with all its monthly meet ups. So 'Bravo' to Silsden!!

Activities and projects can then begin to sustain themselves as parishioners become more involved and take ownership of what they themselves have set up like First Tuesdays Friendship Club in Silsden.

An important part of Embrace has been networking with other churches and community groups to ensure its sustainability.

This group has been very active and has engaged with other local groups in the town that support dementia work. The guys particularly enjoyed an inspirational talk by ex England soccer player Gareth Seddons who spoke about his colourful career. This resonated with 2 of the breakfast clubbers, Mike Hellowell, as he is also an ex England player and Ronnie who is Mike's buddy and taxi driver.

The group also enjoyed an end of year meal at The Woolly Sheep where they connected

with the local Baptist church.

This group will continue to meet as it does every Friday at 11 am at Wetherspoons.

This has been made possible by the continued interest of Dementia Friendly Skipton who see the group as an inclusive and community based activity where people with dementia and their carers can talk about issues that affect them in a safe space.

Dementia Awareness Raising in Keighley Schools

Embrace has worked together with Dementia Friendly Keighley over the past 2 years to offer age specific dementia awareness sessions to Mini Vinnis and school council pupils at all 3 primary schools in the town: St Joseph's, Our Lady of Lourdes and St Anne's. The sessions have been enjoyable and interactive with the children understanding the concept of supporting older people in their families.

At Holy Family School pupils from Years 8 and 9 have learned about being dementia aware at PHSE sessions in 2017 and 2018. Whilst older pupils studying Health and Social Care in Years 10 and 11 have learned about the importance of good communications with older people through our info sessions. If they continue their studies at Keighley College and then qualify as Social Workers they will need to know



how to work with those living with dementia and their carers.

This kind of work has been very effective and it has been new work for both Embrace and DFK in giving sessions to the younger age groups. It is important to talk to the younger children if we are to create dementia friendly schools and towns in the near future.

Catholic Care (Diocese of Leeds) has been delivering Embrace locally as part of a national initiative of Caritas Social Action Network. (www.csan.org.uk). What we have learnt in the parishes involved in Embrace is being summarised into a set of guidance notes for other parishes in England and Wales. The toolkit will contain tips and tricks to discern and organise activities with older people, prepared specially for the contexts of Catholic parishes. This will complement existing resources available to local churches. We expect the toolkit to be launched in late 2019.
